Museum Director Report for October

- Total visitors for the month was 78 from Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Oregon, Florida, Illinois, Tennessee and Ontario, Canada.
- I was sick with a mild case of Covid for four days and the museum was closed which impacted our count.
- We have slowed down though due to school being back in session and the end of the regular tourist season.
- On Oct. 31, I had two young men from the BNSF Maintenance of Way department stop by. They were in a company truck and toured the museum. Both live in Missouri. They were impressed with all of the items we have.
- On Nov. 3, I had two engineers from the UP visit. They were from Hutchinson and McPherson and were on their way to Big Brutus and decided to check us out. They too were very impressed with the museum.
- On Oct 20, we had two of our local neighbors come by and ask if they could take pictures of their Ford Mustangs with the 1023.
- Had to replace the batteries in the outside alarm. Larry came out with some and we installed them. Took a little time from both of us to figure out why the alarm code wouldn't clear but we finally got it done. The system has worked fine since.
- I finished up cataloging all of the recent donations which we have received quit a few within the last several months.
- I went to the SEK Museum Alliance meeting on Monday Nov 4th in St Paul. I distributed brochures to several area museums. The speaker was with the Freedom's Frontier National Heritage Area and she described what they are and how to join, which is free. They also give out grants up to \$3,000 with no matching needed. We may want to look into this and join. They cover much of eastern Kansas from the KC area to the Oklahoma border and several counties in Western Missouri. They are a Federally recognized organization which receives funding through the National Park Service.

Election of Board Members

At the annual meeting, election of board members was held. This year, board members Ed Brinkmeyer, Connie Payton, and Brian Carlson terms were expiring. All three agreed to continue as board members and there were no other candidates for the positions. All three were chosen to continue for another three years by acclamation. Old Business:

CD Expiration:

Discussion was held in regards to the expired CD that the club has at the Labette Bank. Larry Spahn and Brian Carlson are going to look at investment options for the money from the CD.

Highway Signage Project:

Darrell Cave updated the group on the Heartland's application with the state of Kansas to have signs erected along nearby highways advertising the museum. The state contact for the project inquired about the name for the signs. Confusion had arisen due to the various names that we have listed on our website, on the Kansas tourism website, etc. Darrell informed them that we are going with "Heartlands Railroad Museum". We will work on getting the name consistent across our different advertising venues.

Train Show Report:

Rob McKnight reported that he will be at the train show in Joplin on November 30. He is already looking at 2025 with two possible shows in February. He also mentioned using a small TV to play some videos showcasing our facilities and activities.

New Business:

Outdoor Lighting:

Many of the flood lamps on the grounds are in need of replacement. The shelter on the 1023 locomotive and the Carona Depot are not functioning. It was estimated that we need a minimum of 16 flood lamps to replace the current ones. As soon as the bulbs can be obtained, a lift will be secured to replace the bulbs on the 1023 shelter. The ones on the Carona Depot will be replaced then as well. All replacement bulbs will be LED bulbs.

December Train Rides:

The 2024 Watco Santa Express Train ride will held on Monday, December 9th. There will be two rides, the first at 9:00 am followed by a 10:30 am ride. Both will depart from the usual boarding area at the intersection of Monroe and Elm Streets in Pittsburg. Members wishing to help on this ride need to be at the loading area no later than 8:30 am.

Monthly Museum and Visitors Report:

John Chambers gave his museum and visitors report:

The Maine Narrow Gauge Railroad


In the August newsletter, I talked about the Conway Scenic Railroad in North Conway, NH. The CSR was one of the stops on our summer trip to Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. As we worked our way to the coast of Maine in enroute back to Boston, we stopped in Portland, ME. There we visited the Maine Narrow Gauge Railroad.



Our Train for the Ride

The MNGR operates about 1.5 miles of track along the Casco Bay coast in Portland. The Maine Narrow Gauge is not your typical narrow gauge. As most of us know, the standard gauge for almost all trains in the country is 4 feet, 8.5 inches. Most narrow gauge railroads in the United States have a gauge of 3 feet apart. The Maine Narrow Gauge Railroad has track that is 2 feet apart. The history of how the 2-foot gauge came about is an interesting part of their history.

In the latter part of the 19th century, Maine, like other parts of the country were expanding in trade and commerce. However, the hilly and heavily woody terrain made the cost of putting in a standard gauge railroad extremely high. Railroad engineers discovered that a narrow gauge line was much cheaper to construct and easier to build in the terrain unique to Maine. The rails could be laid quicker and would allow the train to go around tighter curves and navigate the hilly and rocky landscapes. Narrow

gauge offered an affordable option to reach mines, quarries, factories and isolated towns, reaching places the standard gauge lines could not. Taking inspiration from narrow gauge lines in Wales, the 2-foot gauge was found




The 2-Foot Gauge

to be the best fit for construction, maintenance and traffic flow for Maine. Estimates were that it cost 1/3 to 1/2 as much to construct the 2-foot gauge than a standard gauge line. Although, more affordable, there were disadvantages. Locomotives, passenger cars and freight cars had to be scaled down. As a result, this limited their power and speed. However, during the late 19th century, high speed was not a concern for most


From the 1870's to the 1940's about 200 miles of narrow gauge lines had been laid in Maine. There were eventually five railways: Sandy River & Rangeley Lakes (1879-1935), Bridgtown & Saco River — Bridgtown & Harrison (1881-1941), Monson

(1992-1943), Kennebec Central (1890-1929) and the Wiscasset, Waterville & Farmington (1894-1933). Like other areas, automobiles and better public roads spelled the end of the Maine narrow gauge lines. The last to close, the Monson,

is where the present day Maine Narrow Gauge Railroad's locomotives #3 and



The MNGR, founded in 1992, is a 501(c)3 nonprofit educational organization to educate the public and preserve historic equipment related to Maine's two-foot gauge railways. My wife and I really enjoyed our ride on the route. Even though it is a 3-mile round trip, the experience is definitely worth experiencing.
